Dear Commissioners,

I have deep concerns that Conditions 1(B) and 6 included in the California State Water Resources Control Board's Section 401 water quality certification will have a devastating negative impact on our community. The supplemental cold-water withdrawals from Lake Almanor envisioned during summer months to reduce water temperatures in the North Fork Feather River will be especially harmful, should those conditions be included in the new license.

I live and work in the Lake Almanor Basin. Our local economy has two primary drivers, forestry and tourism. The Collins Company, and Sierra Pacific Industries, both manage forests here. The Collins Company, our largest employer, also operates a lumber mill here, shipping lumber products all over the Country. Lake Almanor is a world-renown cold water fishery, producing record setting Rainbow and German Brown Trout, drawing sportsmen and fishermen from all across the Western US. The lake also attracts thousands of vacationers every summer, many spending their entire summer here to enjoy the boating, water sports, and cooler summer temps offered here.


